Treasurer



Doreen graduated as an RPN in 1979, received her BA in 1991 and MSA in 1997. Doreen's clinical roles were at SMHC, Seven Oaks Psychiatry and Manitoba Adolescent Treatment Centre. Her leadership roles began at MATC as Director of Residential Services. In 1997 she was intrigued as regionalization was beginning in Manitoba. She became the VP Planning in the Interlake Regional Health Authority from 1997-2012 and her responsibilities included Mental Health services, health planning, strategic planning, capital projects, and leadership in areas like Quality, Risk Management and Patient Safety. In 2012 she assumed a new portfolio when two regions amalgamated as VP Primary Health Care which included mental health, public health, community wellness, chronic disease prevention, nurse practitioners and First Nations and Metis Health. As a leader in large complex health systems, her education and skills as a RPN were always a great asset.

She consistently consulted the people with lived experience, families, staff, leadership, stakeholders, community partners and other national and international people to discover and implement new ideas and create new best practices.

Some of the projects included: establishment of the Family Advisory at SMHC, construction of the Tyndall Building and Acquired Brain Injury Residence; development of the acquired brain injury program; evaluation of

the Psychosocial Program; implementation of a new pharmacy medication dispensing system; implementation of a comprehensive electronic clinical record (including Resident Assessment Instrument for Mental Health (RAI-MH) and National Rehabilitation Reporting System (NRS); participation in the Canadian Mental Health & Addictions Quality Initiative; assisting Artists in Healthcare to provide clients a range of opportunities in art, music, dance, and Playback Theatre; and completed the 2015 Selkirk Mental Health Centre's Consultation Strategy and Environmental Scan to assist SMHC in its ongoing strategic directions. In 2017, Bonny was one of 150 Canadians chosen as a "Difference Maker" in mental health and addictions and in 2019 won the Manitoba Government Service Excellence Premier's award. Bonny has been a RPNF Director since 2015.

REPORT TO THE 2021 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING May 12, 2021

This past year has been an unprecedented year as the world has had to manage with the many challenges presented by the Covid-19 pandemic. It has changed the way we live our lives and for many people it has increased their isolation and loneliness. The need for Registered Psychiatric Nurses continues to increase as they fulfill a unique role in the mental health system, working with individuals, groups and communities; assisting them with their mental health, wellness and recovery.

The Registered Psychiatric Nurses' Foundation's (RPNF), is a registered charitable organization that supports psychiatric nursing education and excellence by awarding seven scholarships, up to eight awards of excellence, two gold medals of excellence, and a bursary. This year the Foundation is awarding nine scholarships (5 Provincial and 3 National scholarships valued at \$5000. This year two additional scholarships will be awarded through the funds from two scholarships that did not have applicants.

Each year, through the Manitoba Awards of Excellence Program, we ask for nominations of Registered Psychiatric Nurses (RPN) who are excelling in leadership, clinical practice, education, and research. This year we changed the criteria that required that one of the nominators had to be an RPN. We heard how many RPN work in a variety of roles where they may be the only RPN. So we eliminated the barrier. It is our role is to celebrate and highlight the great work being done by RPNs! This year we are presenting three awards; two in leadership and one in clinical practice.

The scholarships and Awards of Excellence will be presented this evening via Zoom.

In 2020, the College of Registered Psychiatric Nurses of Manitoba (CRPNM) transferred the privilege of awarding the Gold Medals of Excellence to two graduates of the Bachelor of Science in Psychiatric Nursing (B. SC.P.N.) from Brandon University. While due to the pandemic, the ceremonies were cancelled, the Foundation was able to present the recipients with the new RPNF Gold Medals of Excellence - Shelby Eng from the Brandon Campus and Taylor Maida from the Winnipeg Campus.

Brandon University also awards the RPNF Bursary to a student who has completed 3rd year and is entering their 4th year in the B.Sc.P.N. program. The 2020 bursary was awarded to Jessica Kis valued at \$700.00

The Foundation was not able to hold the annual Grey Cup raffle last year due to the pandemic. Instead we held a virtual 50/50 raffle which ended up being fun and successful! Thank you to everyone who participated! This last year we also sold a number of RPNF clothing items and water bottles.

Congratulations to Dr. Beverley Hicks, a Board Director, who is the author of "Politics, Personalities, and Persistence: One Hundred Years of Psychiatric Nursing Education in Manitoba"! Dr. Hicks is *donating* \$10.00 from every book sale to the Foundation. Check it out! It is a great read. <u>Thank you Beverley!</u>

Stay tuned for the 2022 Psychiatric Nursing Education Event – "Celebrating 100 Years of Psychiatric Nursing in Canada, in terms of education and practice." A great team of RPNs from the four western provinces have formed a committee and are busy planning for May 2022. Treasurers report on RPNF Financial Statements Year Ended Dec 31, 2020

Dean Jenkyns from Jenkyns Smith- Chartered Professional Accountants conducted the 2019 audit for the RPNF this year.

The Independent Auditor's report opinion states "the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the RPNF as at Dec 31, 2020 and the results of its operations and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations." In other words we received a clean audit!!

Statement of Financial Position

Our assets include \$13,816 in the bank as cash and \$85,158 in marketable securities at TD Waterhouse. Therefore at the end of 2020 we have \$99,224. This does not include accounts payable of **\$3002**.

Statement of revenues and expenditures

To give you an idea of where the **\$12,298** revenue comes from:

Donations- \$7,471 which includes donations through Canada Helps and direct donations via our website. Of note is that this year we no longer have access to CRPNM debit plan deductions or the awards banquet, therefore we are looking for new ways to find donors. Our donations were down by approximately **\$1,400** this year.

Fundraising Revenue - \$2,830 from our new 50/50 draw, which resulted in an increase of **\$800** this year.

Interest- \$1792 from our TD investment portfolio.

Promotional sales- \$205 from the sale of water bottles and clothing

Our larger expenses this year included:

Fundraising expense \$1,813 for our 50/50 draw, which is expected in this type of fundraising endeavour.

Meeting expense \$179 which includes the video-conferencing charges which support all committee, board and special project meetings. This year we found that ZOOM was much less expensive and we saved almost **\$500**.

Office, printing and stationary and other has increased by **\$1000** to include our contract for Admin services from Audrey German.

Professional fees \$3,727 which includes the audit fee and the accounting fees. These fees rose by **\$1000** as this was the first full year of having accounting service contract with Kathe Meseman

Scholarships and Bursaries \$4,500 which includes all scholarships in 2020.

Website \$1,543 which includes our fees to the new website provider. This line has increased by approximately **\$300** as this is our primary communication method.

Statement of Changes in Net Assets.

This year we had a deficiency of revenue over expenses of **\$1026**, therefore our net assets now stand at **\$96,222**.

The goal of the study is to define noncriminal exploitation experienced by people with mental illness and to explore roles and obligations of mental health workers encountering this exploitation. Katherine also hopes this research will further challenge the profession to become aware of how mental health providers unintentionally reinforce discourses which marginalize people with lived experience of mental illness.

Karen Batson Award of Excellence in Psychiatric Nursing Practice - Leadership

Karen Batson is the recipient of the 2021 RPNF Award of Excellence for Leadership. Chief Batson graduated in 1987 and has always been conscientious and a hard worker. Her leadership, dedication and easy going manner are positive qualities that are admired by others. She currently serves as elected Chief of her Indigenous Community of Pine Creek, Manitoba, where she was raised. Karen has worked tirelessly as leader of a community with many very serious challenges. Strong leadership skills and great courage have been essential assets for Chief Batson as she has navigated a range of challenges while improving the quality of life for her community. Financial self management was

restored in the first two years of Chief Batson's leadership tenure. She aggressively negotiated major highway repairs with the Province, ensuring safe access to her community as well as acquiring federal funding for mental health initiatives such as the planning, development and building of a youth program centre with a multidisciplinary staff, through "Jordan's Principle". Additional accomplishments include training, development, and equipment for safety and security needs. Chief Batson also facilitated the reopening of local businesses and services that had previously been closed, ensuring renewed access to a range of goods and services for constituents. Under her leadership, housing expansion of 33 new modular homes, the construction of a multi unit Elders Residence, Arena expansion, and other new building projects for Pine Creek are underway. In addition, 5G internet cable is currently approved and being trenched toward the Community, earmarked as a youth initiative protect for 2021. Formerly, Karen has worked as an Assistant Professor of Psychiatric Nursing at Brandon University (a position being held by Brandon University for her should she decide to return) developing a necessary skill set in forming Indigenous Mental Health Professionals. Karen is an active participant in the Southern Chiefs Organization of Manitoba. In 2018, Karen was a speaker at the United Nations in New York regarding the impoverished conditions of many First Nations people in Canada. In 2019 she received an Award of Recognition in the Manitoba Legislature for leadership in the advancement of Indigenous issues. In 2020 she was an Indigenous Representative to Cuba to explore links and the development of health care initiatives in a Canadian context. Karen is a dedicated and loving wife, mother and grandmother. She has consistently embraced her many challenges with great enthusiasm, devotion and energy. 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RPNF Medal of Excellence

In 1998, the Registered Psychiatric Nurses' Association of Manitoba (RPNAM) began awarding the RPNAM Medal of Excellence in Psychiatric Nursing Practice to students who met specified criteria, and were graduating from the psychiatric nursing education program at Brandon University. When the RPNAM mandate changed, and the College of Registered Psychiatric Nurses' of Manitoba was established as strictly a regulatory body, it was noted that while it was a pleasure to do so, recognition of graduates through this award would fall outside the scope of a regulatory body.

Accordingly, in 2019 the Registered Psychiatric Nurses' Foundation, Inc. was approached by the College and invited to assume the honour of awarding the Medal of Excellence to graduating students. Given the Foundation's existing dual function providing Scholarships and Awards of Excellence, the role of awarding the Medal of Excellence was seen to fit well, and the RPNF Board enthusiastically added the Medal of Excellence in Psychiatric Nursing Practice to its annual presentations. The purpose of the RPNF Medal of Excellence is to promote values of safe, competent and ethical practice in future Registered Psychiatric Nurses by recognizing leadership, academic excellence and clinical proficiency among students in an approved psychiatric nursing education program in Manitoba. The Medal is awarded annually to two (2) graduating students in the Bachelor of Science in Psychiatric Nursing Program at Brandon University who have consistently demonstrated these standards. One medal is awarded to a student from the Winnipeg campus and one is awarded to a student at the Brandon campus.

Faculty members from the Psychiatric Nursing Education Program, Faculty of Health Studies, Brandon University select the two (2) annual recipients based on criteria mutually agreed upon between the Faculty and the RPNF. Recipients of the RPNF Medal of Excellence have demonstrated * academic excellence, through consistently high attainment in prescribed coursework, * excellence in clinical psychiatric nursing practice demonstrated through high achievement in clinical courses, including the senior practicum, and have demonstrated * leadership through involvement in professional, community and / or student activities.

The RPNF proudly awarded its first two Medal of Excellence in Psychiatric Nursing Practice in 2020. The Medals would typically be presented at the BScPN reception(s) following Brandon University convocation, however due to Covid 19, this event did not occur in 2020 as per usual, and presentation of these Medals was delayed until the Fall of 2020. Registered Psychiatric Nurses (RPNs) Expand Practice to Remote Learning Support Centres

Barbara Nixon and Kelly-Ann Stevenson are Registered Psychiatric Nurses who epitomize diverse psychiatric nursing careers. The duo currently job-share a psychiatric nursing position in the newly initiated Remote Learning Support Centre in Winnipeg as part of the clinical team addressing the health and well-being of students and teachers engaging in the province's pandemic-related remote learning program.



Barbara Nixon graduated from psychiatric nursing in 1983 and has worked as a psychiatric nurse in a wide variety of settings including in-patient rehab, child & adolescent day treatment, the school system, adult community mental health, emergency room psych liaison nursing, depot clinics and resource development as well as program planning with the Mental Health Branch. Barbara has done ground breaking work developing the psychiatric nursing role at both Manitoba Hydro and Manitoba Public Insurance providing employee assistance services and workplace mental health promotion,

before expanding to disability management and vocational services, quickly discovering that her psychiatric nursing experience with children, adults, families and health promotion positioned her perfectly to address needs within the corporate setting.



Kelly-Ann Stevenson graduated from psychiatric nursing in 1984 and has spent her entire career working with youth. Kelly-Ann applied her psychiatric nursing skills within a wide range of roles at the Manitoba Adolescent Treatment Centre, Youth Forensic Services and Marymound Youth Addictions Stabilization Unit focusing on addictions and trauma. Kelly-Ann is also experienced in labour relations and has held the position of 3rd Vice President with the MGEU as well as participating in the Governor General's Tour in 2008 representing Manitoba on issues of Mental Health as well as Labour. Kelly-Ann notably co- presented to the United Nations Commission Status of Women on "Lessons from the Heart"

with members of the indigenous community, and has held positions of VP of the National Council of Women of Canada, as well as President of the Council of Women in Winnipeg.

When the pandemic hit and schools pivoted to online learning, Kelly-Ann and Barbara took their combined nearly 80 years of psychiatric nursing experience to the Remote Learning Support Centre. Remote learning is essentially the eye of the pandemic for young people, and this duo quickly demonstrated that Registered Psychiatric Nurses are equipped with the ideal skill set to assist youth in these unprecedented times. Barbara and Kelly-Ann underscore appreciation for all members of the clinical team (Psychologists, Occupational Therapists, Social Workers) however pride themselves and fellow psychiatric nurses on the ability to provide aspects of the services offered by fellow professionals, while applying specialized skill sets targeting the bio-psycho-spiritual-social and community spheres of families' lives, as well as expertise in psychiatry such as ability to perform mental status examination, understand psychotropic medications and evaluate contributing physical factors. Barbara and Kelly-Ann assert that psychiatric nurses are inherently trained to apply the most holistic, inclusive approach to mental health intervention of all professions.

Since the program's inception, Barbara and Kelly-Ann have oriented the school system to the diverse role of psychiatric nurses, coaching teaching staff on a range of communication strategies and leading practices as well as providing direct interventions with youth and families dealing with a myriad of mental health difficulties in the context of pandemic. They are passionate about the importance of promoting the scope and role of psychiatric nurses in schools, and note that there are youth (with mental health needs) who are thriving in the remote learning setting and may benefit from ongoing remote learning services post-pandemic.

As anticipated, the pandemic has had untold impact on the lives of youth and families, as well as the school system and beyond. Families are experiencing high acuity pandemic-related stress in their homes. Routine contacts with families frequently reveal complex stressors, and the need for crisis response and brief intervention. Job loss, financial pressures, grief, home-schooling burden, social isolation, crowding and normal health anxiety are commonplace. By



assisting the entire family, psychiatric nurses can ensure wrap-around support for the child. They have found that youth are experiencing increased anxiety, depression, social isolation issues, dysregulated emotion, eating disorder and addiction. On a positive note, by connecting with youth in their home setting, the clinical team has an opportunity to better understand home-life factors in the context of a child's academic life.

Virtual work poses challenges, however Barbara and Kelly-Ann agree that psychiatric nurses are trained to think outside the box, creatively finding ways to engage without visuals, interpreting (sometimes) sparse "chats" and performing assessment using combinations of all methods. They note that a significant portion of their role also revolves around building relationships and providing education to teachers. Both Barbara and Kelly-Ann believe that the presence of RPN's in the school system would dramatically reduce absences and prevent suspensions by enabling early and preventative intervention.

Notably, their job sharing arrangement has effectively combined the skill sets of two highly experienced professionals, assisting children, families and staff through not only the robust standard knowledge base of psychiatric nurses, but the expertise of a psychiatric nursing duo specializing in youth mental health, crisis intervention, brief counselling, trauma, behavioural treatment, family therapy, accommodation and rehabilitation, addictions, forensic services, feminist and culturally appropriate intervention, mental health promotion and mental health literacy.

Barbara and Kelly-Ann offer the following advice to psychiatric nurses trailblazing emerging roles for psychiatric nurses. "Apply for jobs that fit with the full scope of your profession, whether or not a job posting cites RPN qualifications. Continue to appreciate and demonstrate your value as a psychiatric nurse. Once a psychiatric nurse's holistic skill sets are recognized, doors continue to open. The possibilities for psychiatric nurses pioneering diverse career paths are limited only by ones' own hesitancy. Never stop promoting yourself and your profession".

Congratulations to these outstanding RPN's for their diverse and challenging career paths. They set an example to all psychiatric nurses by pushing boundaries and demonstrating the unique versatility and expertise of psychiatric nurses in unprecedented times.

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
